This celebration provides the campus community to recognize faculty, staff, and administrators for their exceptional service to students and contributions to our College and District. Then last week, the Office of Academic Services and the Academic Senate collaborated to host a Retirement in honor of our four retiring faculty members: Lindell Bruce, Jackie Fitzgerald, Pat Pohl, and Sophie Rheinheimer.

The campus community also came together to acknowledge the achievements of our gifted students at the annual Student Recognition Ceremony. This year the event was held in the beautiful Bankhead Theater, as we've outgrown our on-campus facilities. More than 150 awards and scholarships were handed out, marking the students' academic talents and hopefully inspiring them to continue their educational pursuits.





**Campus Boulevard Phase I-III** The Design team redesigned a simplified project due to the original design being over budget. The Design Team is currently studying the comments and ADA accessible routes. Design stopped to coordinate with SSA design concepts.

#### District-wide Information Technology Building

The site utilities are complete along with the structural footings and the building slab. The exterior walls and interior corridor walls have been framed and put in place. Roof joists are currently being installed.

#### College Center for the Arts

Work continues to be on schedule. The structural steel frame for the music classroom wing is complete and the metal stud framing for the exterior walls is underway. The erecting of structural steel for the northern part of the building, including the theater audience chamber and fly loft is proceeding. Work on the tele-data infrastructure is complete. Excavation for the Amphitheater has started and rough grading has facilitated the installation of the electrical infrastructure.

#### Collier Creek Storm Water Outfall

Design documents are nearly complete. The final geotechnical report has been issued and the design is now being finalized to reflect those recommendations. Submittal to DSA for permit review was submitted in March 2009. The anticipated approval date moved to May 2009.

## Facilities Update

#### Central Utility Plant

Southland is installing rebar and forming slab for a scheduled pour this week. Installation of underground plumbing and electrical lines complete. Structural Steel for building will be delivered within 3 weeks.

#### Maintenance & Operations Facility

Presently the construction Carports A & B is complete. M&O shops and storage facilities were located to the new site in early December, allowing construction to commence on the Districtwide Information Technology Building and the Central Utility Plant. The Notice to Proceed has been issued to start the fabrication of the M&O office building and the take-over entity has presented a schedule that shows completion in July 2009. The Shop Building is expected to be complete and ready for punch list review by the end of April, the high voltage cable has been delayed until early May. Therefore, the punch list will be completed when all the electrical devices are up and tested. Paving for the entire site is complete.

#### P.E. Phase III (Outside Loop Road)

Document submittal to DSA for permit review took place September 29, 2008. DSA final approval was received in March 2009, based upon feedback from DSA. The project will be bid with three options, CM at Risk delivery method selected.

#### Parking Lot H & Photovoltaic (Solar) System

The parking lot was completed for use in the Fall Semester 2008. All shade structures were installed in January 2009 and solar equipment installation, including photo-voltaic panels, is now completed. Wiring and interconnection of the components is now underway. The entire installation at both parking lots "E" and "H" is scheduled for substantial completion by April 30, 2009.

#### **Student Services & Central Administration**

Steinberg Architects selected. Architect selection and Board of Trustees authorization to award a design contract is planned to be complete May 2009.

#### Multi-Disciplinary Education Building

This project is complete. Notice of Completion was filed with the County Recorder January 29, 2009. Repair of the stucco and building exterior system is required and the District is in negotiations with the contractor to perform or pay for the repair work. Design of the remedial work is underway and plans will be issued to a contractor to perform the repair work starting this summer. Further investigation of the stone façade on the building exterior has revealed that the stone is not adhering to its substrate, also the stone at the interior walls has been removed and has been replaced with sheetrock and paint. The exterior repairs are currently being bid by three selected contractors and that work is expected to start the first part of June.

#### LPC Fire Alarm Upgrade

DSA issued permit approval for the Fire Alarm Project on January 15, 2009. Bids opened on March 5, 2009 and 10 Bids were received. All bids rejected due to irregularities. Work to be managed by Southland Industries.



#### **Child Development Center**

Notice to Proceed was issued on March 16, 2009 with 528 calendar days to complete the project. Lathrop has mobilized and demolition began the week of March 30, 2009. Lathrop started mass excavation last week and are scheduled to complete this week. Lathrop moved the Ricoh Center and Building 100A over spring break.

#### Science Building Phase II

Design documents are nearly complete. The final geotechnical report has been issued and the design is now being finalized to reflect those recommendations. Submittal to DSA for permit review was submitted in March 2009. The anticipated approval date moving to May 2009.



#### **Aquatics Center & Soccer Field**

The synthetic turf multiuse/ soccer field is substantially complete and the College has taken beneficial occupancy. The Aquatics Center has moved toward completion, the pool house roofing and exterior are finished. The pools have been filled with water and the filter system and mechanical systems are functioning. The pool water is now heated and the County Health Department has approved the pools for use. Installation of the security cameras and sensors' is proceeding. Substantial completion of the Aquatics is scheduled for May 11, 2009.

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
