The Future of Las Positas College on the *Horizon*

In October, Dr. Pollard and her executive team accepted an invitation from the Center for Community College Development to join representatives from fourteen other community colleges at the Strategic Horizon Network's Winter Colloquium to discuss organizational development and issues facing institutions and leaders in higher education.

The Strategic Horizon Network (SHN), which began out of the University of Michigan in 2004, works to assist participating institutions "move beyond conventional approaches to management and leadership by committing to new ways of doing business in five areas: I) analysis and creation of opportunity, 2) assessment and reporting of value, 3) enhancement of strategic management capability, 4) change design and management, and 5) leader development throughout the institution." Anne Arundel Community College (MD), Lorain County Community College (OH), Rio Salado

College (AZ), and Tulsa Community College (OK) are among the SHN participants. The colloquium was focused on exploring ways to build organizational capacity through abundance theory to unleash the full potential of the College.

These concepts were shared with the campus community earlier this month when Dr. Pollard launched the Strategic Horizon Network at the November Town Meeting. She engaged the staff and faculty in dialogue around a series of questions to generate thoughts on the conditions needed for success, embracing opportunities, and looking not only at what we do, but how we do it.

Next steps in this two-year initiative include identifying additional College representatives to join the SHN team, and continued dialogue at Division Meetings, informal "Yak 'N Sak" sessions, and in the soon to be created online "Futuring Forum Think Tank."

Campus Boulevard Phase I-III

The Design team redesigned a simplified project due to the original design being over budget. The new design was presented to the User Group in April, 2008. Input provided at that meeting was given back to the user group in August, 2008. Final comments were returned to the Design Team in September, 2008. The Design Team is currently studying the comments and ADA accessible routes. Upon approval construction documents will be completed.



College Center for the Arts

Work continues per schedule. Basement walls and foundations for the music classroom wing are underway. The erection of structural steel for that wing is scheduled to begin on December 8, 2008.

District-wide Information Technology Building

Board of Trustees has awarded the construction of project to Pencon, Inc. of Livermore. Notice to Proceed is expected to be issued December, 2008. Construction is scheduled to complete December 2009 for occupancy in January 2010.

Fire Alarm Upgrade

System design is complete and DSA comments have been issued. A meeting with the user-group will take place November 20, 2008 to review these comments. The engineer will then complete response to all DSA comments and resubmit for final DSA approval in December. 2008

Facilities Update

Central Utility Plant

Southland mobilized and commenced work on the utility loop in April, 2008. The utility loop was completed August 29, 2008, six weeks ahead of schedule. The Design Build Contractor, Southland Industries has finalized detailed design for the Central Plant. The project will be submitted to DSA for access review November, 2008. DSA approval is expected by February 2009. Construction of the central Utility Plant will commence directly upon DSA approval.

Maintenance & Operations Facility

Construction commenced in August, 2008. The site grading is complete. Presently the construction of Carports A & B are done. The construction of foundations for the warehouse / shop building, and fuel depot are underway. Due to weather and unforeseen underground utility and soil conditions the milestone to finish hardscape and temporary pad has been moved from October 15, 2008 to December 2008, depending upon weather. Achievement of this milestone will allow the existing Maintenance & Operations shops and storage facilities will be relocated to the new site allowing construction to commence on the District-wide Information Technology Building. The M&O office building supplier has defaulted on their contract and their surety has taken over responsibility to deliver this building. The schedule to finish the M&O office bldg. is under negotiation with the surety, Liberty Mutual/Guardian Group.

P.E. Phase III (Outside Loop Road)

Document submittal to DSA for permit review took place September 29, 2008. DSA has issued comments on fire / life safety, structural and access comments have not yet been issued. Upon issuance of all comments the A/E team will respond to all comments and resubmit to DSA for final approval. The project will be bid with three options as the budget for the complete project as designed is inadequate.

Solar PV System/Parking Lot H

The shade structures and solar panels, wiring, and components have been DSA approved. The parking lot was completed for use in the Fall Semester 2008. Shade structures and solar equipment are planned for installation in December, 2008 over the semester break. The installations will be sequenced to allow at least one half of each parking lot to remain in use at all times during the shade structures and solar equipment installations. Solar panels and related equipment, including shade structures for both parking lots "E" and "H" are scheduled for final completion by May 2009.

Student Services & Central Administration

This project was put on hold in the Schematic Design phase due to the difficulty gaining consensus around the configuration of the building. The project design will restart pending the selection of the design delivery method, specifically Design Build or the traditional A/E design, bid, and build. The delivery method decision and procurement planning is expected to begin in the coming months culminating in the selection of a Design/Build team or Architect to restart the design of the project.

Multi-Disciplinary & Physical Education Buildings

These projects are complete. Rework of stucco and building enclosure systems is required and will be performed by the contractor. Design of the remedial work is underway and will be issued to the contractor for completion by Summer 2009.



Child Development Center Invitations to bid were published in October according to the Public Contract Code. On October 29, 2008 forty-nine (49) interested parties attended a mandatory pre-bid meeting, of which thirty-five (35) attendees were general contractors who are eligible to bid on the project. Bids will be opened on December 4, 2008.



Aquatics Center & Soccer Field

The synthetic turf multiuse/soccer field is substantially complete and the College has taken beneficial occupancy. Final landscape planting and lawn areas were completed in November, 2008 at the multi-use playing field, as well as the necessary handrail/guardrail installations around the field walkways. The Aquatics Center has continued with the construction of the Pool House. The shell has been completed with roofing activities underway. The ceramic tile work for the two swimming pools was completed, as well as the installation of the mechanical systems. Beneficial occupancy of the Aquatics Center is currently scheduled for December 2008 for occupancy January 2009.

Collier Creek Storm Water Outfall

Design documents are 85% complete. Upon submittal of the final geotechnical report, construction documents will be completed. Submittal to DSA for permit review is expected December 2008 with approval expected March, 2009.
