In 2008-09, 55% of CSU graduates and 28% of UC graduates began their college years at a community college — and, upon transferring to either four-year institution, obtained GPAs equal to, or better than, "native" UC or CSU students, and graduated at rates comparable to "native" UC and CSU students.

Did You Know...

Homeland Security

80% of firefighters, law enforcement officers and EMTs are credentialed at community colleges. 39 colleges administer Police Officers Standards and Training (POST) academies. 64 colleges have fire technology programs for training firefighters.

Nursing

70% of the nurses in California received their education from community colleges.

Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics

Transfer students from community colleges to the University of California account for 48% of UC's bachelor's degrees in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM).

Enrollment

24% of all the community college students nationwide are enrolled in a California community college.

Job Ratings

Community colleges have the highest combined "good/excellent" job rating, 65%, among California's three segments of public higher education (according to the latest PPIC poll).

Personal Income

California's personal income will decline by 11% by the year 2020 unless the state increases the number of Latinos who attend college.

Earnings

\$1.6M is the average lifetime earnings of a graduate with an associate's degree — \$400,000 more than for a high school graduate.

Diversity

1 community college district (Los Angeles CCD) educates almost 3X as many Latino students and nearly 4X as many African American students as all of the UC campuses combined. Nearly 1/4 of all Chicanas and Chicanos who receive doctorates first attend a community college.

Participation Rate

Almost 90 out of every 1,000 members of the population attended a community college in 2008-09.

Bachelor's Degree Achievement

Nearly 2/3 of community college students who transfer to UC complete a bachelor's degree within three years of entering UC – a rate comparable to "native" UC students (i.e., those who were eligible and entered as freshmen).

Meeting notes by Carol Edson and Brenda Weak

Staff reports:

Steve Gunderson

- O Work is continuing on bond projects. Quotes are being taken for the sound system for the CCA. All equipment for CDC is here and installation will start soon.
- Upgrades for security are in progress. A dish system will be installed so that security will have access to information in case of a major disaster away from campus.
- The math X classroom in Building 600 will be receiving new computers and computer tables. These are planned to be installed by summer.
- Windows 7 was installed in the computer classrooms in Building 2400. There have been no issues.
- o Meetings are scheduled to discuss equipment for the new science building.
- O As buildings are closed, technology parts are being salvaged for use in the replacement areas.

Elizabeth Noyes

- o Federal law mandates that by Oct 2011 colleges have available on online net cost calculator where students can calculate the cost of attending college. Work has begun on this.
- Updates have been done to address accessibility (vision) issues with the LPC home page.
- o The web page advisory group has been established and will meet in February.
- o Online catalog is an upcoming project.

Heidi Ulrich

- Enhance 911 upgrade has been done. All 911 calls will be copied to the security office and security officer's Blackberry. Previous system has been scrapped and \$270 is being saved per month.
- o Caller id problems have been resolved.
- CDC equipment is here and ready to be installed.
- New student copier machines have been installed and are running with few problems.
- Features of new copy machines include:
 - Prices per copy are just over 1cent for black and white and 6 cents for color.
 - User codes can be installed system wide not just at each printer one at a time
 - Prints sent to each printer enter the print cue.
 - Reporting capabilities are more robust.
 - Color printing can be done on glossy and card stock. Color printing and cutting can be done on 12x18 size paper.
 - Special folds and glued binding can be done.
 - Outsourcing costs may be reduced.
- o Program review is in process.

Scott Vigallon

- O Blackboard 9.0 upgrade went well except that they upgraded to the wrong service pack service pack 4 instead of service pack 5.
- o Blackboard will be upgraded to 9.1 this summer. Workshops will be offered.
- o New distance ed accessibility guidelines have been released by the state chancellor's office.
- o Illuminate Bridge can now be used in Blackboard to enhance use of CCC Confer
- Access to online training for Microsoft is now available free to faculty and staff.

Information about low cost Microsoft software for faculty has been made available. Since this
is also available for students and students may not know about it, it was suggested that ASLPC
help spread the word.

Jeanene Methe

- Google Voice is now available.
- Work is underway to increase wireless accessibility as part of the bond project.
- o A problem with new Blackboard/Zone login has been fixed.
- Waitlist committee work is ongoing with a pilot scheduled for spring.
- A document imaging system is being implemented with bond money. This will first be used by financial aid and a&r. This will allow document access on Banner.
- SARS call can be used to generate large-scale emails. Financial aid and a&r are now using this.
 LPC financial aid and a&r will use next.
- SARS does not have texting capabilities. There is no plan to acquire texting capability as this
 would be costly at this time.
- SARS can also be used to set up appointments for counseling.
- o Internet outage on first day of school was due to a bottleneck in the firewall service. John Gonder commented that single points of failure are a problem. Jeanene said that in this case there was a backup system, but this was turned off until the cause of the problem was determined.
- The STARS upgrade that requires students to enter two letters of the last name was part of an upgrade that we did not know was coming. This has called delays in the PE building.

A motion was made, seconded and passed which recommends that a librarian be restored to the committee in addition to the Arts & Communications division member. It is not clear whether the committee can make this change or whether it is a shared governance decision that must be approved.

A suggestion was made that printing on the new copy machines could be set to a default of 2-sided as is done with copying. There was no interest in this.

It is preferred that the copy machines be used for printing rather than the printers. Bob Kratchovil stated that when the printers no longer become usable due to no more printing toner, all printing will be done on the copy machines.


After more time of use, a survey of satisfaction with the new copiers will be done.


Work on putting forms online is continuing and is very tedious as there are many forms and a lot of complications. A big question is acceptance of electronic signatures. Are paper copies of signatures being retained for auditing purposes? Are we asking for too many signatures, in general. Jeanene will check with H&R about their acceptance of electronic signatures. A task force concerning electronic signatures will be formed. Fredda Cassidy, Angela Amato and Elizabeth Noyes volunteered for the committee. Jeanene will send a representative from district IT. Scott volunteered Jeff Sperry. We also need representatives from H&R, A&R, classified staff.

The software purchasing process committee is developing a flow chart for evaluating software.

The open item spread sheet will be addressed at the next meeting. Some items have been resolved and this needs to be updated. Anyone with open items to be addressed was asked to notify Angela ahead of meetings and she will notify the appropriate staff members. We will prioritize items on the open item list at the next meeting.
