Using OneNote in the Classroom Room 2410

Presenter/Facilitator: Donald Hester and David Powers

Description: We intend to provide an overview of how to use OneNote in the classroom, including an overview of how to approach the use of this software in the context of your instruction. One of the benefits of using OneNote in your classes is to enhance student accessibility, as the notes are synced onto their devices as you lecture. You can archive class notebooks indefinitely using OneDrive or another Cloud storage system, so your notes are always organized and available in one place. This session will include an overview of the OneNote system as well as the devices you can use to facilitate electronic note-taking. There will be time for a Q&A session as well as hands-on training. If you already own a laptop or Microsoft Surface Pro tablet, you are encouraged to bring it with you, although it is not necessary to do so.

Middle College High School Student Panel Room 2450

Description: With the impending retirements due to the SERP, many hiring committees will be formed in the Spring Semester. In order to serve on a hiring committee, the employee must attend a hiring orientation. A hiring orientation session would allow classified professionals, faculty, and administrators achieve this required before they are asked to be on a committee.

Classroom Sound

Room 2470

Presenter/Facilitator: Segal Boaz and Amy Chovnick

Description: To what extent are we, as instructors, doing anything other than lecturing? There is evidence that using active learning boosts student learning, but how much time are we actually spending doing active learning in the classroom? We will report on a published study, to which we contributed, which tested out a novel method for measuring active learning in the classroom. Decibel Analysis for Research in Teaching (DART) is a software tool that analyzes classroom sound to predict with ~90% accuracy





the quantity of time spent on a single voice (lecture), multiple voice (e.g. pair discussion), and no voice (clicker, question thinking) activities. Our research focused on STEM classrooms, however the technique is applicable for large-scale examination of teaching practices across disciplines.

Using an Online Game to Increase Engagement in the Classroom Room 2450

Description: Kahoot.it provides a simple and easy way to create a content-based game to play in the classroom. This can be used as a teaching tool and to increase participation and engagement in the classroom. The instructor creates an account and then makes a quiz on the website "kahoot.it". In the classroom, the instructor goes to the website, finds the quiz, and selects "play" in order to obtain the pin for the game. Students simply go to the website "kahoot.it" and enter the pin provided by the instructor in order to play. Content, images and videos can be incorporated into Kahoots and discussions can occur between the questions.

Moving the Needle on Professional Development Planning Priority for Classified Professionals

Description: Much work has been done on our campus related to professional development, with the enhancements of the Professional Development Committee in terms of processes and resources allocated. Practices and procedures have been reviewed and developed to ensure compliance with statewide professional development guidelines for faculty around FLEX days and other regulations.





Classified professionals face unique challenges related to professional development. This session offers an opportunity to extend the conversation about professional development for classified professionals at LPC, and to further move the needle on the current college planning priority. How can we better coordinate available resources to address current and future professional development needs related to educational master plan goals? What processes could be streamlined at our college to increase access to necessary professional development? How can the college make available opportunities for professional development and growth that are more relevant to the classified experience on campus? This session will be a workgroup discussion to explore the opportunities toward: (1) securing professional development during working hours, (2) fostering opportunities to learn from each other in a professional development setting, and (3) implement best practices at our college.

Beyond funding, let us look at what can be done to streamline organization, processes, and college systems in support of this planning priority as it relates to classified professionals. Join us for a constructive discussion. We look forward to input and ideas from the campus community as a whole.

Using the OEI Online Course Design Rubric to Meet Accreditation Standards Room 2410

Description: The Online Education Initiative's Course Design Rubric, endorsed by the LPC Academic Senate, establishes standards of a quality online course. If your course meets those standards, it will meet accreditation requirements. In this workshop, you will learn how to apply the rubric to your course in order to make your course the best it can be. The rubric's sections covered will be Content Presentation and Assessment, but the workshop will focus on Interaction, making sure you meet the requirement of regular, effective contact. It will not cover the web accessibility sections of the OEI rubric; those will be covered in an afternoon workshop today called "Making your Canvas course site ADA-compliant." The LPC Model Course, which was created based





on the rubric's standards, will be presented. The Model Course can be used in your online course as a template to follow while building the rest of your course.

Curriculum Development Room 2414

Description: This workshop is time for faculty to develop or revise curriculum using CurricUNET.

Payroll & Benefits Roadshow Room 2460

Description: This presentation will include information for faculty regarding their retirement program, leaves available, 403B and 457 information, sabbatical and reduced work load, commuter benefits, etc. Our goal is to provide information to faculty so that they can be aware of all options available and give them a better understanding of how they are paid and the benefits that they are eligible to receive.

Disaster Home Preparedness Room 2470

Description: The Disaster Home Preparedness (DHP) presentation will cover the disaster risks we face living in the Bay Area with an emphasis on earthquakes, fires, wildfires, and floods. After discussing risks, steps to plan for those risks in the home will be covered, followed by recommendations for assembling a family disaster supplies kit. The information provided in a DHP is of vital importance because most disasters happen with little or no warning, and survival is closely linked with preparedness. Furthermore, response to an incident as part of a team while on the job or as part of your community is difficult at best and maybe impossible if participants are unprepared at home. From a preparedness point of view, complacency is our biggest foe, thus making the DHP presentation extremely valuable.

Description: ePortfolios have been used for many years as a means of demonstrating student mastery of course/program material and, in many cases, their personal journey. Academic programs develop a course of study, but student success lies in the student's capacity to assess, process, organize and apply information while utilizing available resources that enhance strengths and compensates for deficits. ePortfolios provide a platform in which students can collect, archive and reflect on material relevant to their goals.

Making Your Canvas Course Site ADA-Compliant Room 2412

Description: Whether you teach an online course, a hybrid course, or simply enhance your face-to-face course with online materials, you are bound by state and federal regulations to make your sites accessible to students with disabilities. This hands-on





workshop will focus on ADA-compliance within Canvas. You will learn the basics of web accessibility, along with techniques to use in Canvas and techniques to make Word and PowerPoint files accessible. The workshop will follow the Online Education Initiative's Course Design Rubric sections on web accessibility.

Using Social Annotation to Facilitate Reading between Students, across the Curriculum, and across the World Room 2414

Presenter/Facilitator: Kat King, Katie Eagan, Angelo Bummer

Description: Have you ever found yourself wondering whether an assigned reading passage was too hard, or if students just hadn't read at all? Or maybe you've wished there was a way to instill a better sense of community on a commuter campus? Do you wish there were ways to elicit more diverse voices in your classroom discussions? Perhaps you've wished there was an easy way to model reading strategies to struggling students, or a techie way to help students pull quotes for essays. Come to our presentation and check out Lacuna - free digital annotation software that makes the process of reading social and engaging.

At this Flex presentation, you will work with faculty who've partnered with Stanford to get more students reading and thinking critically about their reading. The first part of this presentation will highlight the many ways Lacuna can add to your classroom, whether you teach in the Sciences or Humanities, in Business or Social Sciences. See which of your students are reading and which aren't. See which areas of a text students are struggling with or misunderstanding. See how your students understand more than you think they do, and are making observations that never even occurred to you! See the way social annotation gives voice to the diverse populations in your classes – from introverts to extroverts, from those who are struggling to those who are high performing, from our immigrant students to the students from down the street. See how texts from different authors or different parts of the world can be put in dialogue with each other.

Because we want Lacuna to be more than just one more addition to what sometimes feels like a tech-overloaded life, we'll reserve the second half to helping you create a reading assignment in Lacuna. Plan to leave with materials you can use or adapt to your classrooms.

Training Session for SLO Coordinators Room 2416

Presenter/Facilitator: Ann Hight and Jennie Graham

Description: This workshop is for discipline SLO Coordinators to help you create plans to ensure that all SLOs/SAOs are analyzed over a 3-year period including how to generate appropriate reports for meaningful analysis of eLumen data as well as automating some of the functions of eLumen. A SLO/SAO Coordinator checklist will be distributed and reviewed. Breakouts are planned to discuss what constitutes sufficient numbers for analysis, which varies depending on the number of sections and frequency of course offerings over the semesters. This workshop is for SLO/SAO Coordinators and for those who want to be trained to become a coordinator.





Guided Pathways – Continuing our Working Conversation Room 2450

Description: EAP Concern/ CLC seminars feature engaging, interactive and actionoriented strategies that increase your understanding and skills.

Identity theft is one of the fastest growing crimes in the nation: one out of every five Americans, or a member of their family, is a victim of identity theft. Whether you are or want to keep from being a victim, we are here to help. We will explain the identity theft crisis, as well as the need for assistance when combating such problems. If you are or have been a victim, our class will tell you how to proceed. Join us as we discuss important strategies and immediate steps you can take to always protect your identity. Your safety is out top concern, so we'll conclude by answering any questions you may have.

Debunking Myths for Men of Color Room 2450

Presenter/Facilitator: Erick O. Bell, Kali Rippel, Michelle Gonzales

Description: Our session will explore common myths associated with men of color in community colleges through experiencing and discussing an interview with Dr. Ivory Toldson, Former Executive Director for the White House Initiative on Historically Black Colleges and Universities, associate professor at Howard University, and editor-in-chief of the Journal of Negro Education. The session will replay an 27-minute interview between Dr. Toldson and Dr. J. Luke Wood, with frequent intermissions to allow for group discussions and reflections.

This session on debunking myths will be designed to both enhance information learned in the CORA training or familiarize faculty and staff professionals with some of the concepts. It is a form of faculty and staff diversity training that provides instruction on sound pedagogical practices that can be applied to all students.

This proposal aligns with the campus' strategic goal of Diversity and Pluralism in its called for "increase[d] capacity of staff and faculty to address issues of diversity', and carrying it out would help us make the key performance indicator "Number of diversity-related trainings/workshops/opportunities for dialogue. This proposal will also help to meet one aspect of the strategic goal of Teaching and learning: "Provide expanded opportunities for professional development that focus on teaching and learning and future trends for new student populations."

This proposal is aligned with the current Student Equity Plan. There is a stated commitment and appropriated funding to provide professional development resources specifically because it highlights one of the "best approaches for addressing the issues"





contributing to the under performance of historically underrepresented students, including men of color.

This proposal is aligned with the current student equity plan and all three presenters attended teaching student of color conferences (CCEAL Annual Convening and Umoja) over the summer that were funded by equity and that further prepared them to facilitate this workshop.

Suggestions for a Successful RAC Request Room 2460

Description: This is a brief presentation on Resource Allocation Committee request submissions and we will be providing examples of successfully funded Non-Instructional Position and Equipment Requests. Q & A to follow.

Important Math Department Program Updates and their Campus-Wide Impacts Room 2470

Description: The Math Department is making significant changes, from placement policies to new course offerings and shorter-term courses. Utilizing best practices as identified by the California State Chancellor's Office and attempting to begin implementing policies from AB 705, the Math Department will offer new co-requisite courses to help students with just-in-time remediation, use high school data more robustly to place students into classes, and consider 8 week "fast track" classes for our high-impacted college level (Math 55, Math 50) and first-level transfer (Math 40, Math 39, Math 30) courses. Serving over 500 FTES each semester over the last academic year, the math program affects a vast plurality of our students. We would like to share these dramatic changes with the campus community and help answer any questions or concerns.
