Call to Order

2. Check-Ins/Introductions of New Members

• Dr. Wilson, new VP of Student Services, Alain Olavarrieta (math, UnDocuAlly), Dan Cearley (anthropology, interest in land acknowledgement), Katie Eagan (English, Global Studies, and new SEA co-chair, Julia McGurk (ESL)

• Shawn Taylor, chair: SEA Committee has spent a lot of time talking, but "analysis can lead to paralysis." This year, let's find most pressing concerns and actually intervene and try things. Design thinking, decision-making process for multi-systemic therapy. If we choose one or two things to do and focus on those, we can really make a difference.

3. An Update About (non-budget) Updates/SEA Newsletter

• We will no longer do updates in these meetings because it takes up too much time. Shawn will include them in a monthly SEA newsletter. By the Friday before the beginning of each month, please send updates and announcements. Heritage month activities would also be good to announce in this space.

4. SEA Budget Update

• We had a 5% increase to base allocation, but it just covered COLA and raises on campus. We are at same operational level as last year. Some carry-over used to put classified on previous year's budget to spend that down so that we'll be in compliance with the state. Most of our budget is for faculty. We would like to use some money for special projects (\$16,500).

5. Equity Innovation Fund/Incubator

• We will also have an equity innovation incubator (\$25,000). What will be the biggest return on investment?

6. Native Land Acknowledgement w/ Michal Shuldman

• If we have a native land use acknowledgement, we want to avoid having it be "performative."

- Should we reach out to tribe whose land we're occupying? Have a scholarship for a Native student?
- Nadiyah: what would the tribe/s want in statement? Should we collaborate with tribes? We also have so little data to track our Native students.
- Dan Cearley: Interested in Chabot's process, they used a website space to have a discussion. Scholarship could be for tribe in general if not a student. Some systemic things have to happen so that it's not performative. Tribes should be pulled in terms of what they are able to do, how they are able to engage us, because this is not their full-time job. We are nestled in four tribal entities within a larger linguistic group. There is a lot of good information out there about what to do, how to enter a self-reflective process.
- Shawn: I would love to figure out a way to increase feeling of belonging for these students and our tribal neighbors.

7. Student Material Needs

- Shawn: Some classes' books and materials are so expensive that students can't take an additional class because they can't afford the materials. He askedCollin which subjects students are asking for help with the most.
- Collin: The library could run a report on this, and they provide a lot of books. Don't always know what help students need if they look online, but the library is still renting calculators, loaning reserve books to students (busy even during pandemic!). Unless one has connections with textbook publishers, library can't get access to online materials. Publishers will not relinquish this. Value added for professor with online materials, but there is a cost to student. Kali may be the current OER representative. Can we highlight courses that use OER or have low textbook costs in schedule of classes?
- Shawn: Licensed materials are very expensive. How can we help the library get what they need, and how can we do an audit of cost of books so that we know what the cost is for each class?
- Katie: who is OER rep? A pro of Hypothesis, the digital and social annotation app, is that there is no cost to the students and faculty can see if they are doing their reading and whether they are struggling with it. It works with OER texts and is embedded in some.
- Chris Crone, DSPS: the Alternative Media Specialist position is not yet filled, but it will be soon. If a student has a verified disability and is in the DSPS program, they have access to Book Share. Kurzweil 3000 gives them access to audio and text manipulation and highlighting. Free audiobooks is something that he was looking into. The student has to purchase the book and verify that they have purchased it.
- Dean Mattern just heard from faculty who said their students couldn't afford books. She referred them to the library, financial aid, EOPS, etc.
- VP Wilson noted that Chabot was trying to have the majority of faculty use free to low cost textbooks. Website has two separate links that help students find these textbooks. "Low cost" means \$50 or less. Might motivate instructors to use low cost or zero cost textbooks to improve their enrollments.
- Katie: Hypothesis also works with using digital textbooks on library website. As far as DSPS OCR-ing of text for a DSPS student, portions of those can be made available to students through fair use. The form that asks faculty to promise not to share the text with other students, then, should be revised.
- Alain: Math is converting some of their courses to open source materials, which have zero cost. He is leading this effort for Math 39. Could we have a voucher for students who need the funds? If there is already something like that, could it be more widespread? It is free to rent a graphing calculator. The next course to provide open source materials for would be calculus, in his mind, but the math department needs to agree on it.
- Shawn: we are doing wonderful things, but it's not narrated outside of the place where it's happening. Students need this information so that they don't feel overwhelmed.
- Julia: If we are going to be noting things in the schedule, ESL books are expensive, but we try to use books for the whole year. Could we also indicate that in schedule? Can we audit what we have in the library on

reserve and what we are missing? When students sell books back, can we create a system that connects students to students? Book exchange would necessitate a system, but students could make money and help out their classmates, too. Shawn said that Laney does this.

- Nadiyah: In ECE, there's been a lot of movement on this. They are in the midst of transitioning almost all their materials to OERs. LibreText is great. They have an ECE textbook lending library for hard copies. Maybe individual programs could have a lending library, too.
- The LPCF has money for books, but what they have isn't meeting the need.
- Terrance: ? Something about budget?
- Jin: Tutoring Center needs access to textbooks.
- Collin: For incubator, there's a software called Leganto that will help faculty collate resources that library already owns. Measure A funds allow people to fund things through library.
- Katie: didn't the library ask for copies of our current books? Maybe audit could track books that we bought with basic skills money.
- Alain: Having a list of textbooks that are available at the library, and have the list circulate every semester. If we know that there is a need, it would push the folks using them to ask for extra copies. We need to develop habit of asking for another copy of textbook every semester. If they have too many
- Shawn: Do we have a limit as far as the age of the books used? Could we still use basic skills purchased books?
- Julia: There is so much trauma in Afghan population. Chill and Chat group coming up.
- Shawn: There is an Afghan mental health organization in Newark. Also, students with disabilities have reasons to choose print over digital in some cases. We want to meet every student where they are. Materials shouldn't be a barrier.
- Julia: New students don't know about books on reserve; can we create a better way to get that information out? Could there be some way to view textbooks on reserve or free for a class if one clicks on the course in the schedule? Alain concurred, ask faculty to put information about available free resources for students.
- Ana: ECE has book loan program, but if students don't get one, they can always go the library. Communicating through instructors is likely the best way. Inform instructors.
- Shawn wants action items, so he will review at end of the meeting.

8. SEA Committee Student Facing Priorities

- What are some priorities that students come across related to equity?
- Shawn: Elder outreach (he is curious to learn about what happened with the QUEST program in the past), AAPI connections, Black students feeling welcome...
- Nezrin (Student Senator): The cost of materials is a huge challenge—it may hold students back from enrolling, or they just try to complete the class without materials. Students are not well-informed—they are not even using Zonemail accounts. Helping students get informed about the programs that are happening so that they are not overwhelmed would be great. How could we increase the likelihood of communications being read? Social media, text messaging system. If there was a newsletter tailored to students, that would be great. ("LPC Connection" not really geared towards them.)
- Jackie (LPCSG Director of Communication): students say that having face-to-face communication very useful. Puente really does that well. She will be doing a newsletter. She enjoyed the AAPI event last week, and she enjoyed learning about other communities.
- Jill wondered if students are accessing the Student Support Hub. Jin emailed Tim Druley about traffic on site.
- Shawn: Sometimes affinity groups can be siloed. A more trans-cultural approach is preferable. People are feeling so hyper disconnected. LPC should be the "third place" for our students.

- Alain: Undocumented students want a place to meet that is safe for them. Even through Zoom, it's a little uncomfortable because it's on the Internet. Other marginalized groups also need a space—community center? They don't want to out themselves by going into an Undocumented Center, perhaps. Having a multicultural center where someone can go and blend in would be welcome.
- Shawn: Such a center would need a facilitator to smooth out friction between different groups that sometimes arises.

9. SEA Committee Internal Priorities

- We are a committee of action and holding the president's plan of action as a priority. Things that we do have a material, positive impact for our students.
- Hold that time at the end of a meeting to make decisions and take action.
- Alain: Changing institutional bad habits that affect POC disproportionately takes time
- Shawn: At the same time, there's a lot of low-hanging fruit that we can access. There has been a lot of change even since he has been here, and people who were once resistant are asking a lot of questions.
- Kristy: Shawn is always saying how important it is to tell our stories. How can our campus tell our story in a way that students hear it, and students know that they have a place here?
- Shawn: We need a "paragraph" that conveys that. And then let the community know. Here's what we have, here's how you get it, here is why. External communications are not uniform—we need a style guide. Every piece of communication should have an ask.
- Terrance: There is too much information, students feel, in these long emails. Messaging is so important.
- Jean: She remembers a Latino outreach group at her child's school, and she learned that distributing flyers is not enough—the communication has to have a personal touch that will draw students and families in.
- Shawn: It would be great to have a faculty night where we talk about what we do to students and families.
- Dr. Wilson—marketing materials need to reflect all students. Website representation of African Americans is insufficient. We should have information in different languages, as well.
- Shawn: Website and marketing materials need to be updated for context, too. We are wearing masks, now, for instance.
- Dean Mattern: Return to campus for students needs to be planned carefully. It's a big mental shift. How can we make that comfortable for students?
- Nezrin asked if we could have a virtual tour of campus on our website.
- Shawn: Can we get out of our offices more and walk around and talk to students? Walk students to where they need to go? We will have a welcome back to campus event for students in October. Welcome back bags will be distributed. We used to have a parent night; caregivers often have no idea how to support their students.

10. Announcements/Open Floor

- Dean Ho: Christina Flora, geology lab tech., said that she has an equity board on the 2nd floor of 1800. She has mounted photos of diverse people in geology and will do one for geography as well. Conversations around equity create sparks of innovation.
- Alain: Latinx Heritage Month events are happening now. They are also doing a faces of LPC project, and photos of Latinx/Hispanic students will be featured on a Flickr account. Send pictures! He also wants to promote the "Know Your Rights" event in particular.
- LPCSG Constitution Day is Friday, Sept. 17 at 11 am—speaker on constitutional rights if approached by law enforcement.
- Kristy: Student Success Team meetings: Sept. 24 1:30-3:30. Focus is belonging.
- Dr. Foster: stay tuned for incubator grant form. He hopes to solicit additional funds and scholarships.
