3. Industry Updates

Yoko Oda – Everything is done via Zoom calls, and it is much more difficult to present interior design concepts this way, and a lot more work. That said, it is becoming mainstream and the number one way of conducting business. Economic concerns – delays in receiving materials and products and limited access to good quality materials/products, price increases with labor and materials.

Michelle Webber – Things are going well! We have two sections of Interior Design 1 and two sections of Interior Design 2. The students are very interested and engaged which has made this semester a wonderful experience.

Nancy Guyette – The delays have been tough to deal with but setting expectations and having these discussions about delays with clients has really been key.

Karen King (via email) – Between design and real estate, we are experiencing high material costs and delays in deliveries along with everyone. Technology, smart energy efficiency for residential and commercial is in high demand.

Rita Lezama (via email) — As far as trends-I use zoom and google meet when I do my design meetings. I still do a physical measure and go to showrooms to select products, but design meetings are done virtually. Lately, the remodeling trends tend to encompass bigger projects. Pre-pandemic, I would typically get just a kitchen, a master bathroom or a master and a guest bath. But now, clients want to multiple rooms like kitchen, bathrooms, and family room as part of the same project. Or if it's a kitchen, they are knocking down walls and enlarging the space. The high demand for remodels has created issues with supply availability which has affected completion dates, and caused material costs and labor costs to increase. Standard construction materials are hard to come by and appliances are also in short supply. In addition, an updated website is more important than ever. It must be mobile phone friendly because people use their phones more than their computers to search.

Skilled labor is hard to come by. The contractors that I have spoken with have expressed frustration about finding good help. Would Las Positas consider expanding the curriculum to add construction?
