New "Math Jam" Adds Up to Success



LPC is proud to be among the first California community colleges to offer a comprehensive, multi-level Math Jam program. Designed to help students achieve their math goals, Math Jam is a free, intensive, oneweek math program offered the week prior to the start of the spring and fall semesters, in January and August. A total of 117 students have registered for LPC's first session, which runs from January 12th through 16th.


Math Jam helps students complete their degree or transfer faster, while introducing them to a community of support and free resources. Students work with faculty and tutors in a self-paced, fun, and supportive environment. LPC offers instruction at all levels: PreAlgebra, Algebra (Elementary and Intermediate), Statistics, and Trigonometry/PreCalculus. Students take math assessments on the first day of Math Jam and get personalized support to help them improve, explained Math Instructor Kristine Woods (in photo below, far left), who developed LPC's version of Math Jam during her sabbatical last semester. She cited many benefits of the program.

"Students can begin a math class ready to learn and confident that they are in the right class," she said. "And, if a student places one level higher at the end of the Math Jam program, it saves them a semester of time and doubles their chances of successfully completing a transfer-level math class."



LPC's Free Services Support Student Success

LPC offers students a unique combination of special programs and services above and beyond the classroom to support success for final exams and throughout the semester. Following is a partial list of opportunities for students, which contribute to success and to LPC's high transfer rate to four-year colleges and universities.



Peer tutoring is one of the many educational opportunities at LPC's Tutorial Center.

Tutorial Center. Last semester, thousands of LPC students logged more than 15,000 hours in LPC's active Tutorial Center. Students can meet for class projects, get both dropin and scheduled tutoring from peers and instructors, and reserve a room for study or meetings. Online tutoring is also available.

Prep2Pass. The Tutorial Center and Associated Students of LPC sponsor Prep2Pass, a popular two-day tutoring event the week before finals. Tutors were available in the Tutorial Center on December 10th and 11th to help about 425 students prepare for exams. Complimentary pizza, snacks, and drinks helped fuel students' success.

Reading and Writing Center. Hurrah for RAW! The Reading and Writing (RAW) Center helps hundreds of students each semester, and offers email tutoring support during finals week. English and English-as-a-Second-Language Instructors provide in-person and online assistance for writing and reading assignments for any class and for transfer and scholarship statements.

Open Math Lab. The Open Math Lab, located in the Integrated Learning Center, offers many free services to all LPC math students, including drop-in math help, study groups, and workshops. Each day, more than 300 students take advantage of the lab, which is staffed by full- and parttime LPC mathematics instructors.

Math X Program. The highly innovative Math X Program

gives students alternative ways to learn mathematics, and instructors provide continuous, personalized feedback, intervention, and assistance. The program is designed for students who want to work at their own pace, need more time to take tests, or want to reduce math anxiety.

English as a Second Language (ESL) Support. Located in the Integrated Learning Center, LPC's ESL support program is staffed by ESL instructors who assist students with academic language skills, including reading, writing, grammar, and oral communication.

Online Learning and Blackboard. Help is always just a click away for students who take LPC's online and hybrid courses, which use Blackboard, a virtual classroom. Students enrolled in Spring 2015 online and hybrid courses can attend an on-campus or a live, virtual orientation.

Computer Center. No home computer? No problem. With more than 100 workstations, the Computer Center is available to students as an open lab with Internet-connected computers and technical assistance from knowledgeable staff.

Library. LPC's library houses computers, extensive research materials and resources, and also offers short courses to help students improve their research skills.

Relaxation Breaks. Ommm.... On December 9th and 10th, students learned relaxation and breathing exercises to help manage stress during 30-minute Relaxation Breaks, sponsored by the Counseling Office.

De-Stress Event. Ahhh.... LPC's Student Health and Wellness Center offered free chair massages, stress management resources, and final exam survival tips on December 2nd, empowering our students to "Keep Calm and Carry On."

"Every year, the best community college teams come together to compete for a championship title. LPC was chosen in part for its state-of-the-art athletic facility, known as "The Nest" for LPC's teams, the Hawks. The facility houses instructional and exercise areas, an indoor track, faculty and staff offices, locker rooms, team rooms, two Fitness Centers, and an athletic training room.
