Yes. We are currently in the process of reevaluating Degree and Certificate programs. One change involves reducing the number of units for elective horticulture courses from 3 to 2. Hort. 67, Hort. 71, and Hort.72.

Enrollments: LPC 117; EastBay 444; Entire Bay Area 280; State 154. LPC's enrollments do not exceed the EastBay, Entire Bay and State. To increase enrollments, make connections with learning communities, such as those in the Adaptive Horticulture Program, as well as local employers, like those involved with our advisory board.

LPC Completions: LPC 0; EastBay 6; Entire Bay Area 6; State 6. LPC's completions meet the EastBay and Entire Bay Area however not State. To increase completions, faculty will encourage students to complete paperwork to earn their certification/degree; faculty will encourage Student Services to effectively implement DegreeWorks; and, we plan to offer all the required courses for degrees and certificates within a 2 year cycle.
