I'm proud of PHOTO's (our team) achievements since the last Program Review. We launched a new AA and certificate of achievement in Fall19 and had to promote the program, teach our classes and provide student support, despite having classes cut and being hit with the Covid-19 pandemic and all the physical restrictions. I'll list some of our accomplishments by semester below.

Fall 20

Photography Program instructors continue to adapt to teaching online. We are working to include handson photography skills and techniques for online teaching. Team Photo collaborated on video demos for various photo processes and to teach some hands-on photo skills.

Our Program's Photo lab Tech has continued to offer part-time online assistance to students in conjunction with some in-lab work to maintain lab functionality.

With permission and following proper safety protocols we were able to check-out equipment by appointment basis to students. Active classes have had emergency DE addendums submitted to be able to offer during the pandemic.

Outreach

We've been working to spread the word about our new AA and Certificate of Achievement in Photography. We worked with CTE liaison Elizabeth McWhorter to coordinate PHOTO Program and student participation in local events to promote the program in the local community. We produced the Artists Speaker Series to give students, prospective students and the extended campus community an

opportunity to experience various artists work and careers. We provided support, guidance and advise to the LPC Camera Club. The Camera club's activities include online meetings and special guest speakers on various photographic topics of interest to students. We've continued to post to the LPC Photography Official web page, LPC Photo Program Blog and LPC Film Blog to keep connected to the extended photo student community.

Training: Our instructors having to teach online with little or no experience. Large amounts of time spent to convert classes to online, difficulty in converting some classes to DE. Harder to explain simple things that are easily demonstrated and then emulated by students with handson.

The Covid-19 situation stopping in-class learning and preventing students from using our program's facilities including lighting studio, computer lab and wet lab has slowed student learning.

Needs: Equipment upgrades and replacements to give students access to hands-on training. Need additional equipment for extended check-out during pandemic and future return to oncampus. Requested lighting equipment through IER for SP 21 lighting class so all students can have access to lighting kits for semester.

- Shift to online instruction has put the students in the position of not being able to access physical facilities including Lighting Studio, Computer Lab, internet and wet photo lab. This has definitely affected some student's ability to connect in class and connect with some concepts due to lack of hands-on in dedicated work space.
- We've tried to mitigate some of the effects of online instruction by having students checkout cameras and other equipment for extended periods of time. I've requested extra lighting equipment through the IER process to enable the students to have a lighting kit for most of the semester.
- We've recorded some lab processes for student resources, provided online speaker series and provided support for the Camera Club to present photo topics exposing students access to diverse artistic styles and hopefully to inspire their work.
