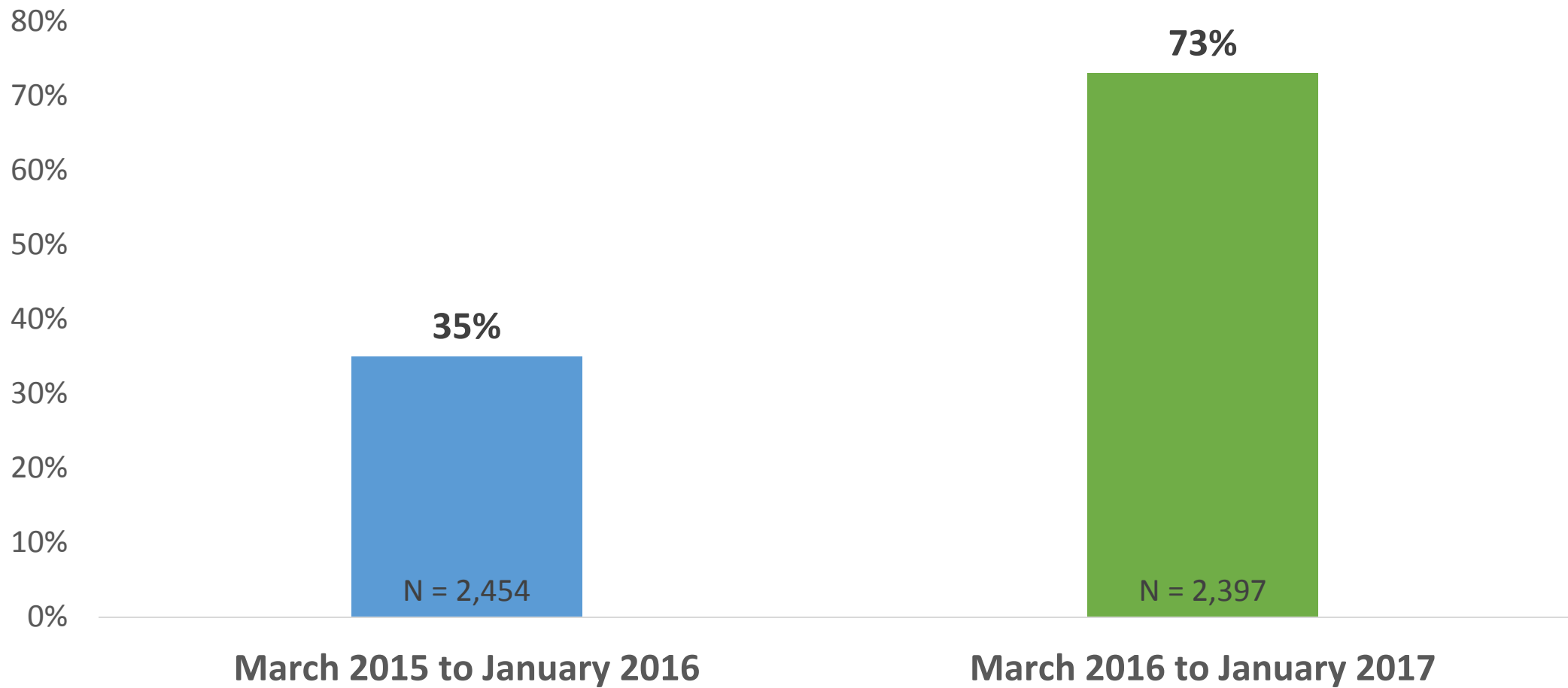

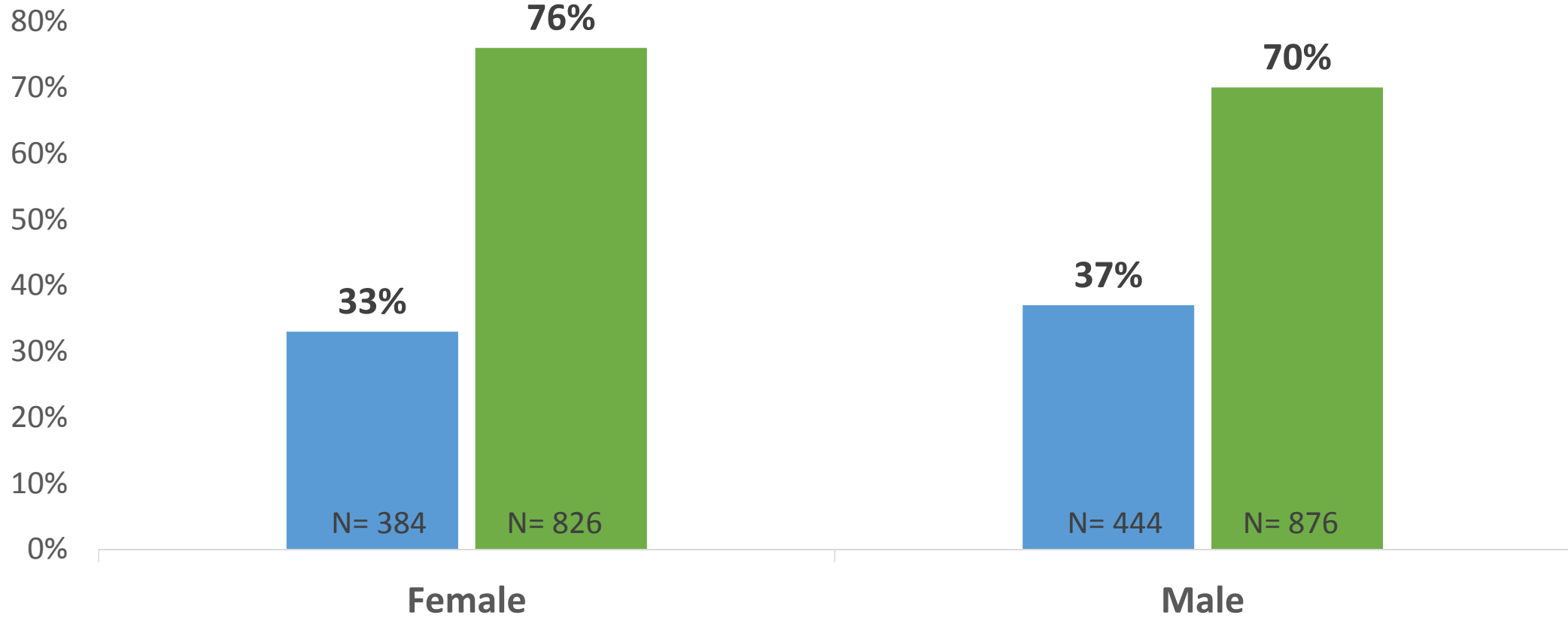

2015-16 vs. 2016-17

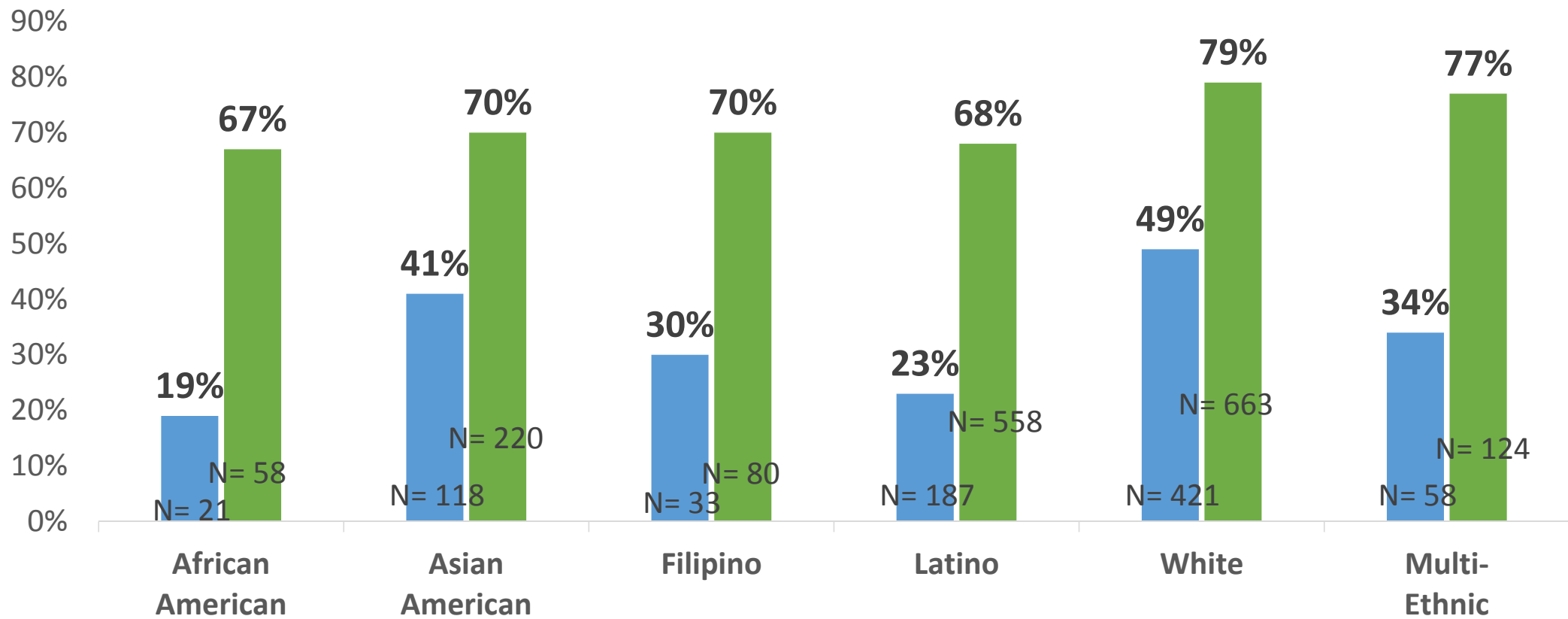
■ March 2015 to January 2016     ■ March 2016 to January 2017

## Assessed into English 1A by Race-Ethnicity 2015-16 vs. 2016-17

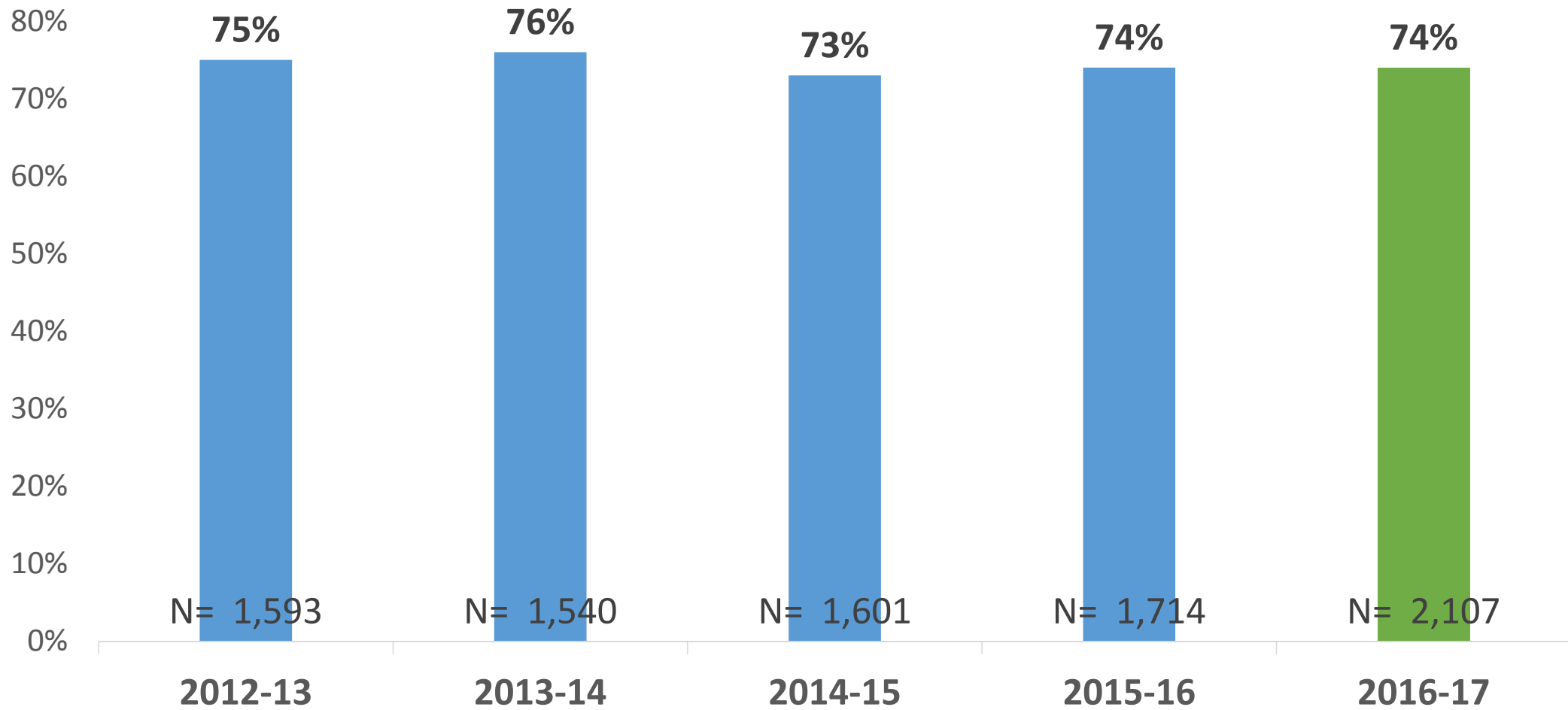

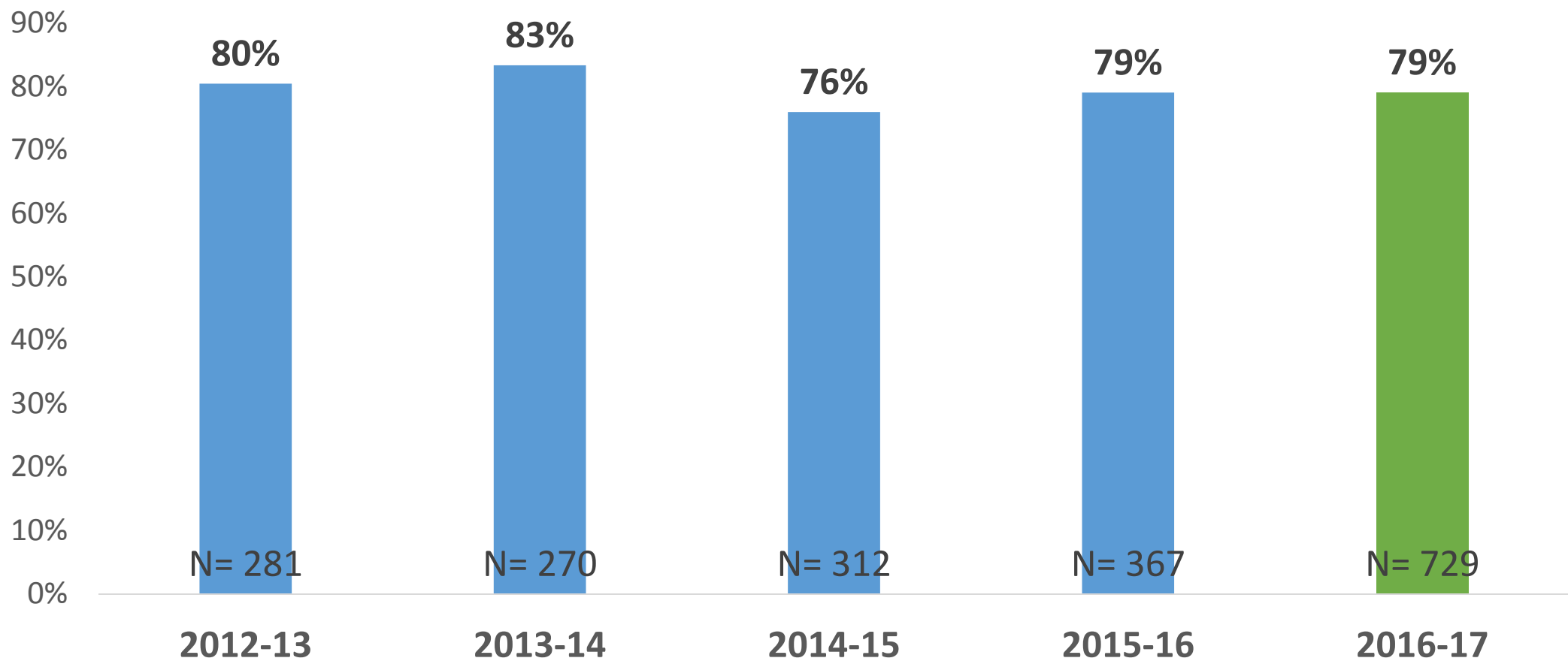
# Impacts of Multiple Measures Placement

- More than doubled students going straight to 1A
- Did away with disproportionate impact
- Ended reliance on Accuplacer, which has been shown to be an inaccurate tool.
- GPA shown to be a stronger predictor of success
- Still, our critics feared wide-spread failure

## Why did we previously believe they were placed correctly?

Confirmation bias: Instructors often have widely held beliefs about students that seem to be confirmed by standardized test placement.

- Race
- Class
- Language learner status
- Reputation of feeder high schools
- Learning disabilities

Instructors may also be biased by the test results themselves to believe low-scoring students are “unprepared.”

# Spirn 1A Grading Policies

- Students may turn in one essay up to a week late with no grade penalty
- Late homework is accepted up to a week late with 20% point deduction
- Missed class activities (quizzes, research activities) cannot be made up
- A student who has perfect attendance (no absences and no more than one late arrival of no more than 10 minutes) does not have to take the final exam
- Students who do not have to take the final exam still have to prepare for the final exam via a series of classroom activities

# Gonzales 1A Grading Policies

- Late work not accepted -- extenuating circumstances may be considered if the student communicates with me at least a day before the assignment in question is due
- Not showing up to class on workshop day or showing up to class with no rough draft results in an F on the essay -- no exceptions.
- A student who has perfect attendance (no absences and no more than one late arrival of no more than 10 minutes) does not have to take the final exam
- Students who do not have to take the final exam still have to prepare for the final exam via a series of classroom activities

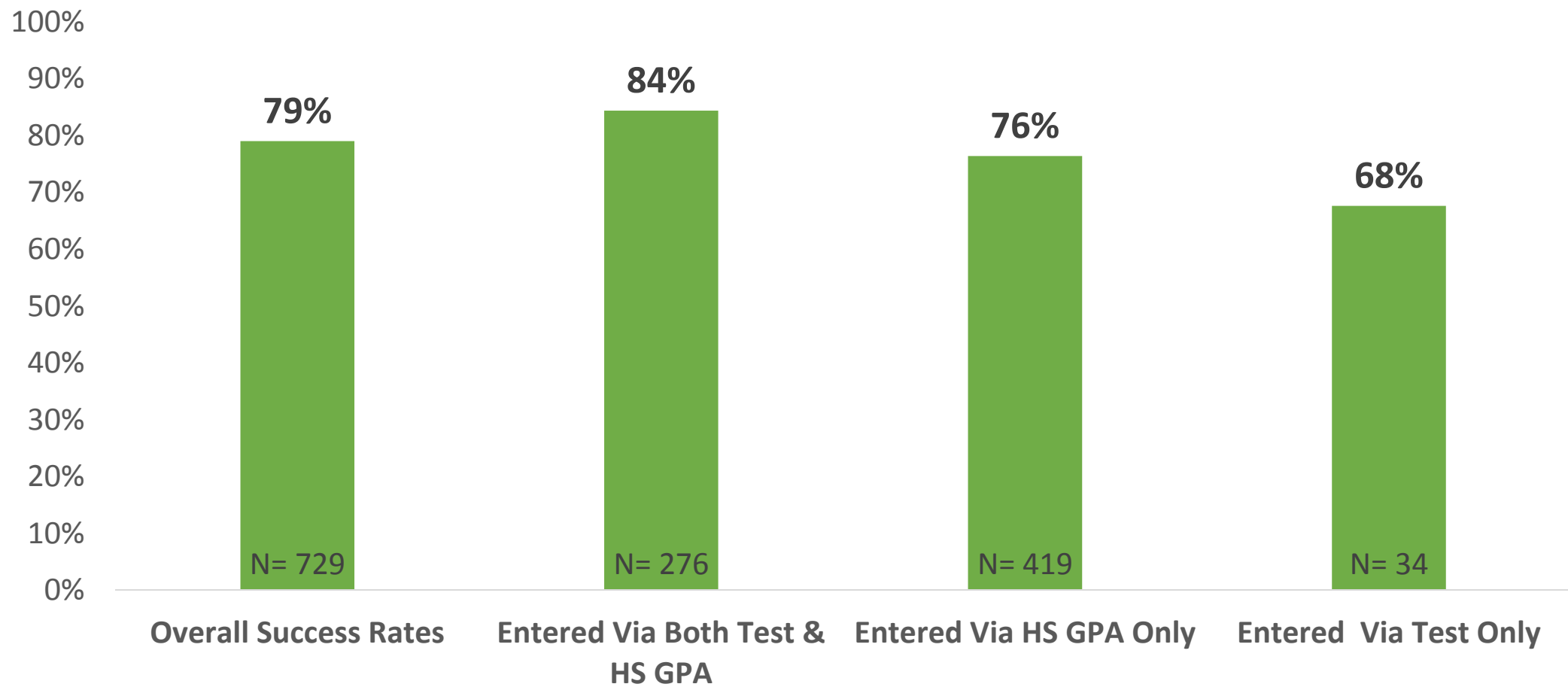
# Faculty Survey Fall 16

Compared to the previous year, students were:

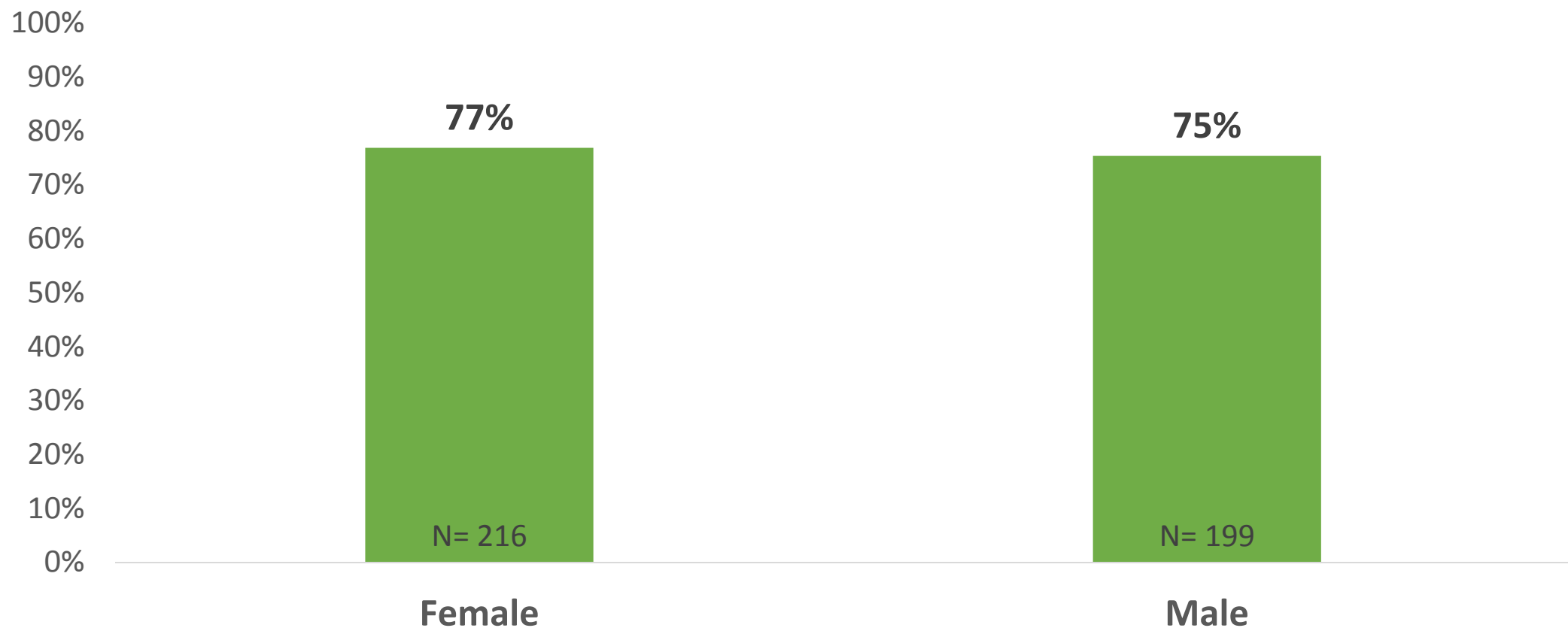
- Equally prepared 40%

(17 responses out of 25 total 1A instructors)

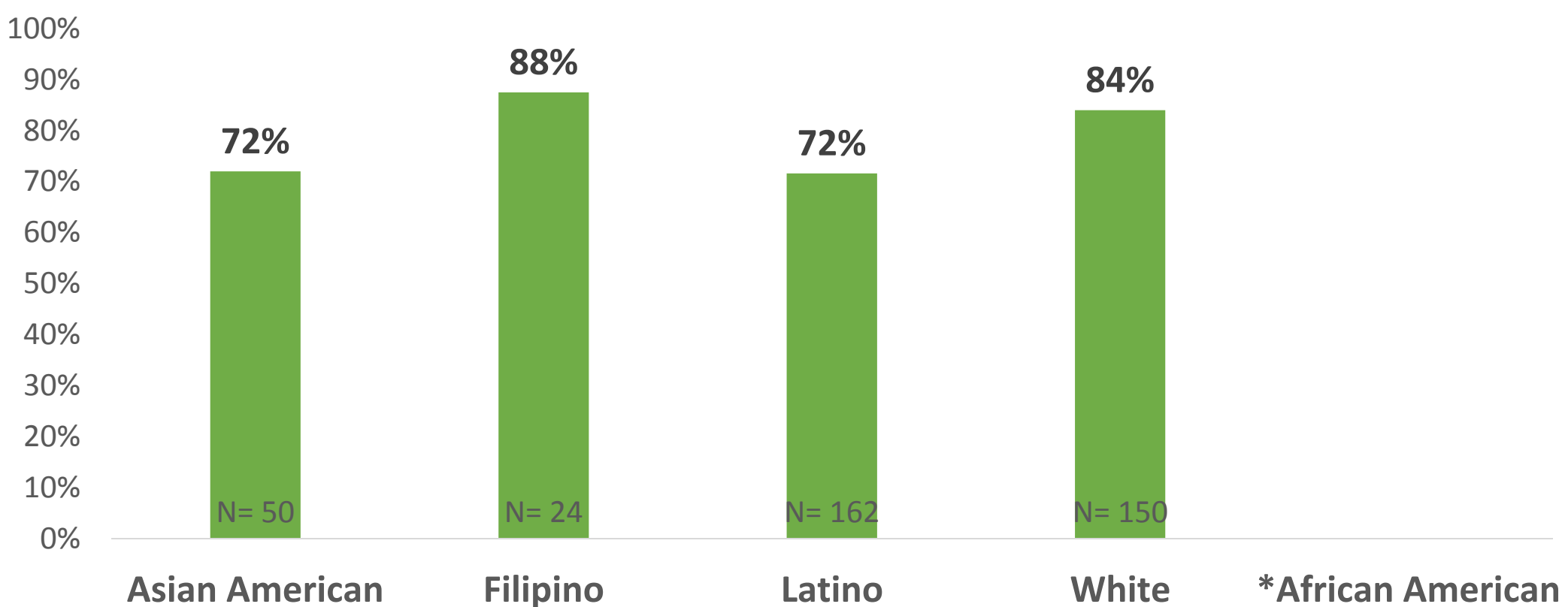

2016-17



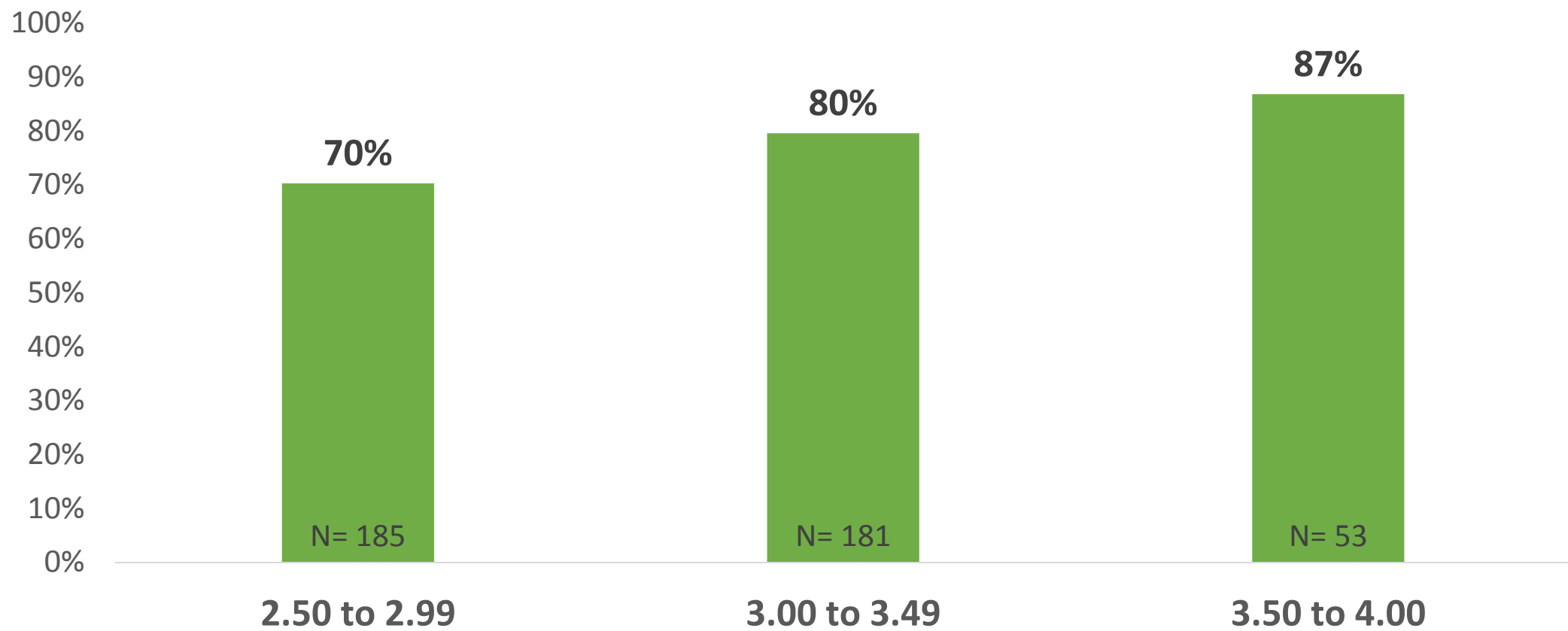

2016-17



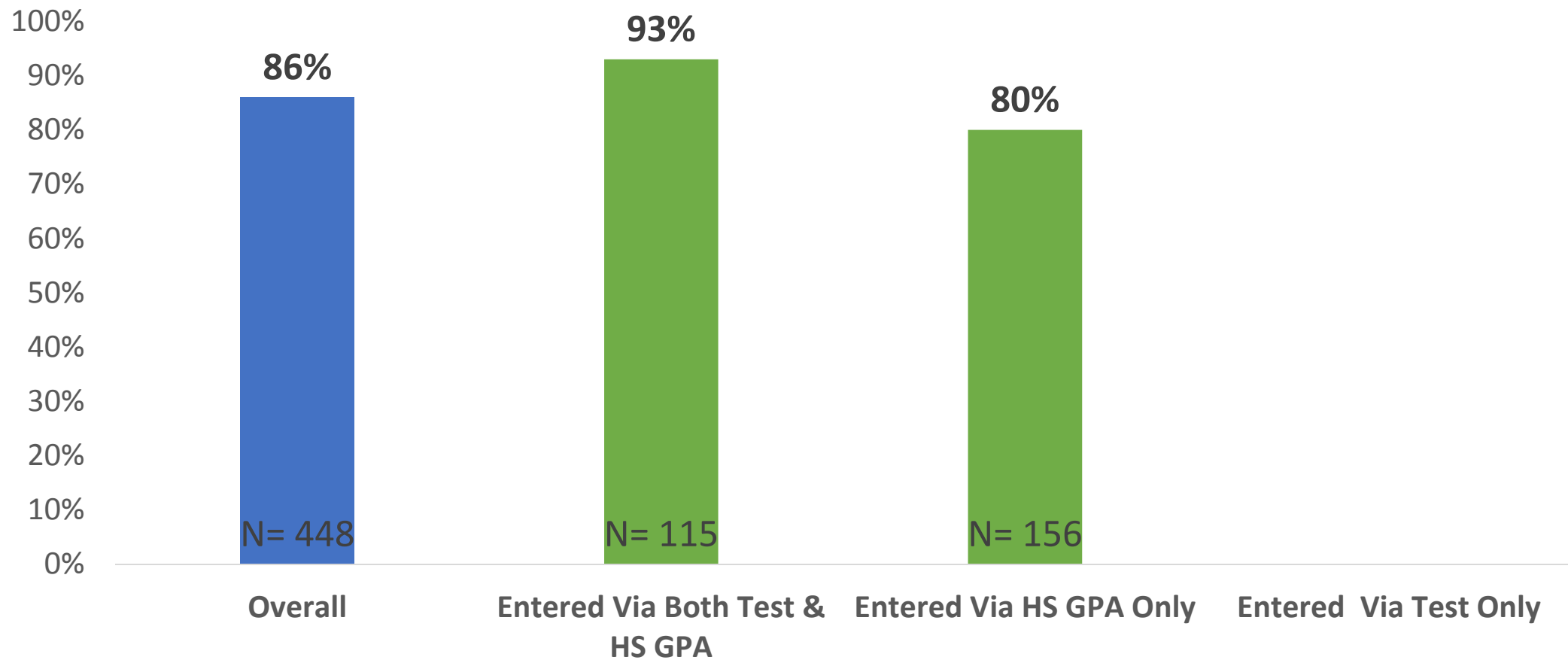

2016-17

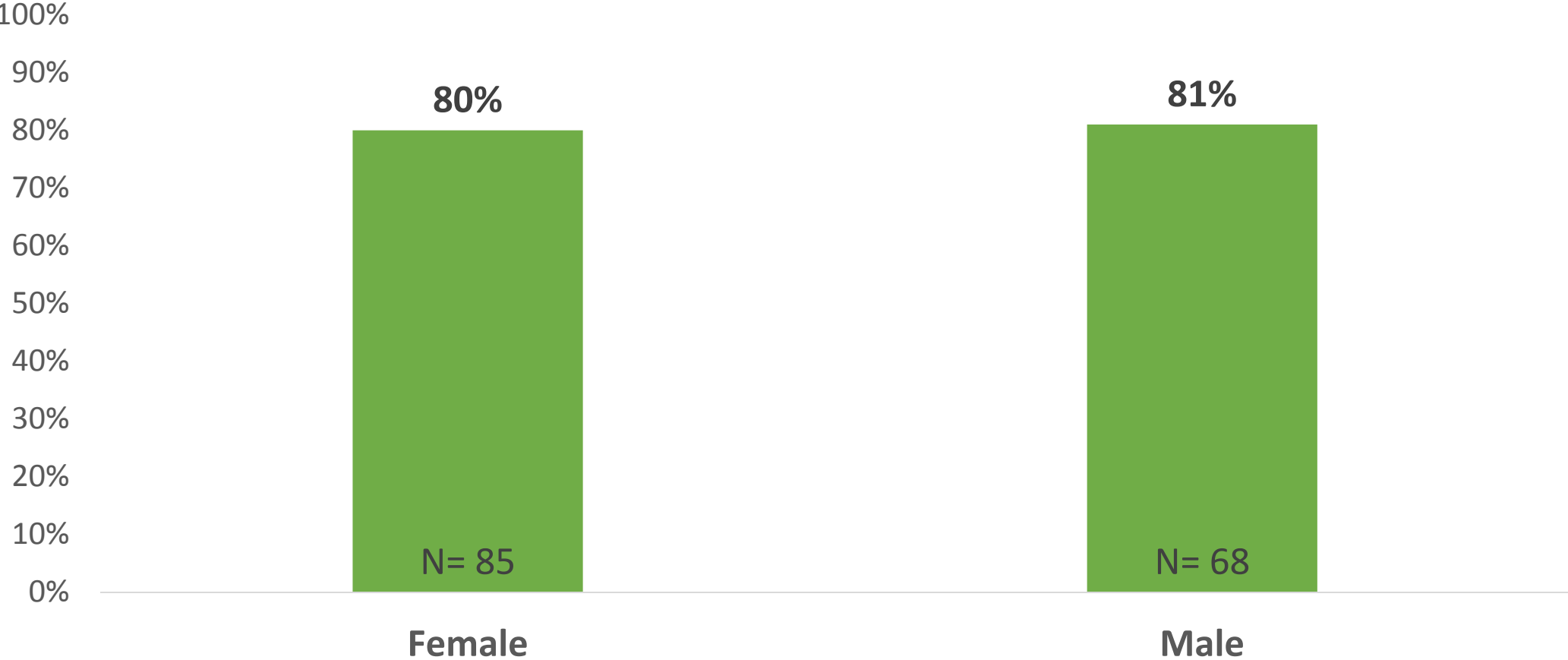


Las Positas College

English 1A (Fall 2016) By Assessment Test Entry Method

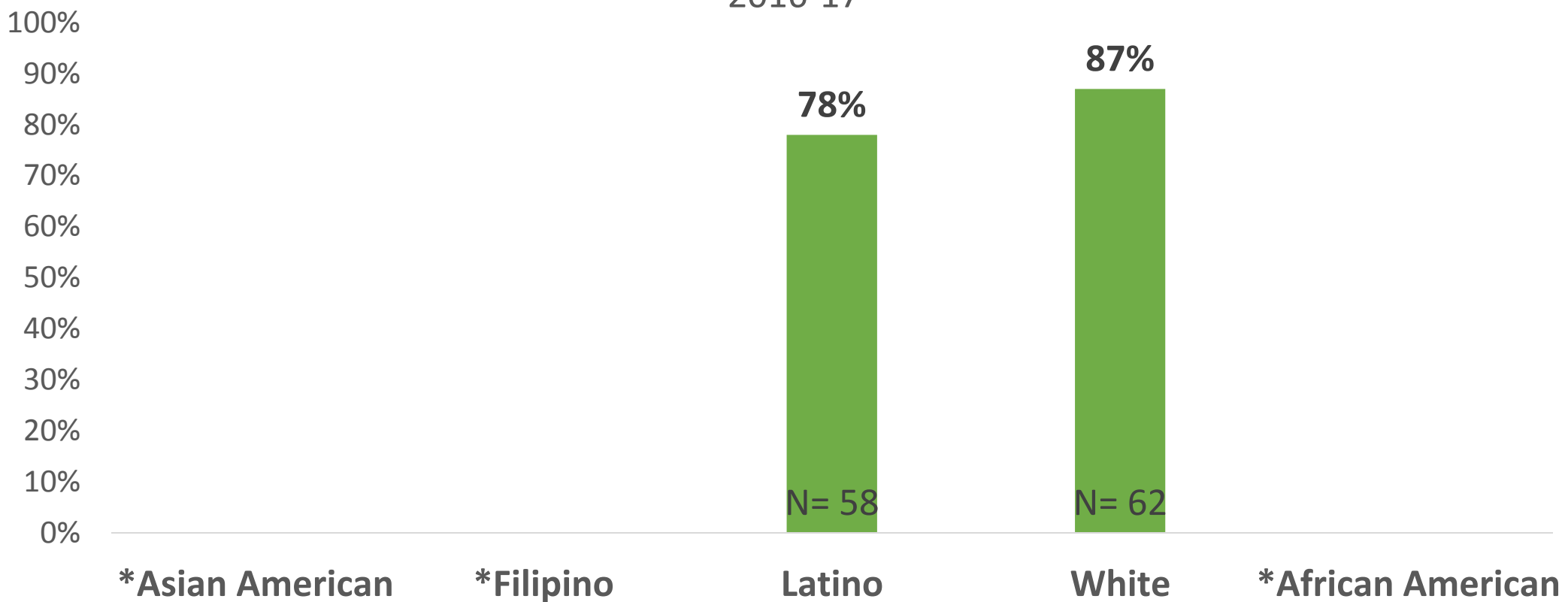
