Frequently Asked Questions

Will I have Middle College students in my classes?

Most likely, yes! On average, MCHS students are enrolled in over 90 LPC courses (over 300 sections!).

Should I ask them to identify themselves?

No. Students may choose to not identify themselves, especially early on. Halfway through the semester, students will present you with a brief progress report for a current grade estimate and feedback on attendance and class participation. These progress reports are shared with parents/guardians and reviewed by the MCHS. This is a great opportunity to share any successes or concerns.

What should I expect from Middle College High School students?

You should expect exactly what you expect from all LPC students. Do not change your rigorous expectations.

Since the students are technically in high school, should I expect to hear from parents/guardians?

No, parents and guardians cannot communicate with you per FERPA.

Can Middle College students join LPC clubs and activities?

Yes, in fact, we had numerous students involved in clubs and organizations last year. Two graduates of the Class of 2018 were the 18-19 LPC Student Body President (Lylah Schmedel) and Vice President (Hariel Colcol).

When students graduate from high school, how many college units will they have earned?

It depends. Students take between 7 and 11 LCP units each semester, so they can earn up to 44 college units, not including summer semesters. In many cases, if students stay at LPC for one year after high school graduation, they should be able to meet transfer requirements. In addition to their LPC courses, our students take three high school classes daily here at LPC - English, Social Studies (US History 11, Civics/Econ 12), and AVID.

- Class of 2017 28 Graduates → The Class of 2017 earned over 1000 LPC units in their two years here. Of the 28 graduates, 22 continued here at LPC with other students transferring to UC Irvine, CSU Chico, St. Mary's, San Francisco State. San Jose State.
- Class of 2018 30 Graduates → Over 20 of the 30 2018 graduates will continue at LPC with a handful heading to four year schools (University of Missouri at Columbia, Bryn Mawr, Colorado Mesa, San Diego State, UC Irvine, CSU Monterey...)
- Class of 2019 → 66 graduates!
