LPC Invited to Apply for the 2025 Aspen Prize

Las Positas College has been invited to apply to the Aspen Institute Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence.

The \$1 million Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence, awarded every two years, is the nation's signature recognition for America's community colleges—as President Obama called it, "basically the Oscars for great community colleges." The Aspen Prize honors colleges with outstanding achievement in six critical areas: teaching and learning, certificate and degree completion, transfer and bachelor's attainment, workforce success, access, and equity for students of color and students from low-income backgrounds.

By focusing on student success and lifting up models that work, the Aspen Prize aims to celebrate excellence, advance a focus on equitable student success, and stimulate replication of effective culture and practice.

The College is one of 150 institutions invited to apply for this prestigious award. It is a two-year-long process that assesses student outcomes at over 1,000 U.S. community colleges, leading to the selection of 10 finalist and, ultimately, one winner.

Ribbon Cutting at Las Positas College for Academic Support and Office Building









Las Positas College was host to over 150 guests to celebrate the ribbon cutting of the newly built Academic Support and Office Building and Landscape Project. The building includes classrooms, computer labs, the tutoring center and the expansion of the College library. Funds for this project came from Measure A, a \$950 million bond that was approved by voters seven years ago.

The project was awarded the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Gold Certification for its efficient, cost-saving and green construction process. The LEED recognition is said to honor the building's environmental, fiscal and social benefits.

The Landscape renovation project is a series of outdoor upgrades to the campus landscape. Designed by Cupples Keller Designs with input from LPC students and college staff, the outdoor space rests at the entrance of the Student Services & Administration Building (Building 1600). Completed upgrades include a new "Las Positas College" sign, new grass and trees, and outdoor seating areas.

Students, staff and community members are welcome to enjoy the newly completed building and outdoor spaces.

President Dyrell Foster Appointed to Workforce Development Board

President Dyrell Foster was appointed by the Board of Supervisors to the Alameda County Workforce Development Board (ACWDB). ACWDB members are respected leaders from different businesses and agencies (private and public) and bring a wealth of experience and diverse perspectives to workforce.

The ACWDB is a 27-member employer-led body responsible for overseeing the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Title I program, outside the city of Oakland.

WIOA services are available to meet the training and employment needs of local area job seekers, including youth and young adults. Business services are also available to help employers meet their goals around talent recruitment and business training needs.
